

Dr Victoria Bladen teaches in literary studies and adaptation at The University of Queensland, Australia. Her publications include: *The Tree of Life and Arboreal Aesthetics in Early Modern Literature* (Routledge, 2022); seven Shakespearean text guides in the Insight (Melbourne) series, including *The Taming of the Shrew* (2021); and eight co-edited volumes, including *Shakespeare on Screen:* Romeo and Juliet (Cambridge UP, 2023); *Hamlet in the 21st century* (Belin / CNED, 2022), and *Onscreen Allusions to Shakespeare* (Palgrave 2022).

Jami Acworth is an early career researcher with interests in Jane Austen, Shakespeare, audiences and adaptation studies. In 2018 she completed her Masters' dissertation at UQ on the role of audiences in prison performances of Shakespeare. She is a long-term member of the Jane Austen Society of Australia and is a frequent contributor at the Brisbane branch. Jami has taught university courses in drama, literature and adaptation studies.

Katherine Ferrett has a BA, majoring in literary studies, and a Master's degree in Writing, Editing and Publishing, from UQ. She is a professional costumer and milliner and has given guest lectures at UQ and to the Jane Austen Society on early modern and Regency costume. Kate also has expertise in Elizabethan food and recipes. She currently works in the medical education field and is an accredited yoga instructor.
